School Fee Payments - direct deposits

Bus Passes

Bus passes must be obtained for students needing to travel on buses that they wouldn't ordinarily travel on. It is important that all students travelling on any of the bus services are accounted for.

Should your child need to travel on a contract bus, a bus pass should be obtained from Steve Broad at M.E.C. (5461 7900). Should your child need to travel on the Castlemaine, Newstead, Maldon or St Arnaud buses, a bus pass can be obtained from the Office - either in the form of a written note or a phone call from the parent or guardian.

Both passes require 48 hours notice.

FROM THE PE DEPT

Physical Education Uniform Trial

In response to student requests, we are currently trialling a change in Physical Education uniform expectations:

Physical Education in Lessons 1&2

The Physical Education uniform may be worn to school when students have Physical Education in Lessons 1&2. In this case, students are expected to change back into school uniform during recess.

Physical Education in Lessons 3&4

Students who have Physical Education in Lessons 3&4 must change into their Physical Education uniform at Recess and back into their formal uniform at lunchtime.

Physical Education in Lessons 5&6

Students who have Physical Education in Lessons 5&6 will change into their Physical Education uniform at lunchtime. They may however, travel home in their Physical Education uniform when they have Physical Education classes in Lessons 5&6.

This trial will not continue if students do not adhere to the expectations above.

Active8 Gym Program

The Physical Education department has developed a new fitness challenge that ranges for all year levels.

How the program works:

- There are 8 different levels. (Red, Yellow, Orange, Green, Blue, Purple, Brown and Black). As the levels progress, so does the difficulty. You are required to complete all the exercises in that level before you progress to the next level.
- It is up to you how quickly you want to complete the level. You do not need to complete all the required exercise in one session. You can complete one exercise for that session and it will be recorded.
- Monday will be Year 7&8 testing, Wednesday will be Year 9&10 testing, and Friday will be Year 11&12 testing.
- Tuesday and Thursday, you can train and practice for various exercises.

What do you get?

 Once you complete the level, you will be recognised on the prestigious Active8 honour board which is located in the Mudbrick.

How to join?

- Collect a Highview College gym waiver form from the PE staff in the mudbrick
- The program will be starting at the beginning of Term 4.

2019 FREE TAFE FOR PRIORITY COURSES

Free TAFE for Priority Courses is a Victorian Government program that will pay your tuition fees to study in selected courses at TAFE, if you're eligible.

Who is eligible for Free TAFE for PRIORITY Courses?

- You might be eligible if you are under 20 years old, or if you are enrolling in a course at a higher level than any you have completed before, but you can check at any TAFE or contact the Training and TAFE line on 131 823.
- A TAFE will confirm your eligibility when you enrol in Free TAFE for Priority Courses.

When does Free TAFE for Priority Courses start?

- Free TAFE for Priority Courses will start on 1 January 2019.
- TAFEs may take enrolments for Free TAFE for Priority Courses that commence in 2019, during 2018.

Which courses will be tuition-free priority courses?

- The tuition-free priority course list includes 20 nonapprenticeship courses and 18 courses that provide pathways to apprenticeships (also known as 'preapprenticeships').
- The tuition-free priority courses lead to occupations in industries where there are likely to be more jobs. Some of them lead to work in important areas like preventing family violence, rolling out the National Disability Insurance Scheme in Victoria and delivering our major infrastructure projects.

INDUSTRY FOCUS - Health (Paramedic/Ambulance Officer)

According to the Australian Department of Jobs and Small Business*, 'Health and Welfare Support Workers' are looking at a 19.2% increase in employment over the next five years and the occupation as a Paramedic/ Ambulance Officer is projected to have a 24.5% increase specifically. It is worth considering this career if medicine and science is your chosen pathway.

Paramedics provide pre-hospital emergency health care and transport for injured, sick, infirm and aged persons to medical facilities and may perform the following tasks:

- Driving ambulances to sites of medical emergencies and accidents that may require the administration of advanced life support.
- Assessing and treating patients at the site and on the way to hospital.
- Administering pain-relieving drugs and replacing fluids, often by inserting cannulas via veins.
- Preparing patient care records and other written reports including a summary on injury/illness and the treatment provided.
- Lifting patients onto stretchers, loading stretchers into ambulances and transporting to hospital.
- Providing routine transport for patients requiring further or specialized treatment.
- Other duties such as; checking equipment and supplies daily.

Paramedics work in a range of weather conditions and are required to assist at a range of incidents, so they work in teams and shifts. They may be called to motor vehicle accidents and medical emergencies inside or outside of domestic premises, building sites and public areas. Specifically, this could include confined spaces i.e. under vehicles and buildings and hazardous accidents such as fires, chemical spills etc. They also work closely with other emergency workers such as firefighters, police and SES (State Emergency Service).

Specialisations in this field include:

- Intensive Care Paramedic Attends life-threatening emergencies and gives intensive treatment to patients before arrival at hospital. (This requires additional training in the areas of anatomy/physiology, pathophysiology and pharmacology to be able to make medical decisions without consultation.
- Paramedic Clinical Instructor Provides training and support to paramedic interns.

Depending on your chosen specialist area, you can refer to the table below for bachelor degree options, which normally are a minimum of 3 years of full time study or equivalent. Upon completion, graduates are then eligible to apply to Ambulance Victoria as a graduate paramedic and complete a one-year practical training programme. However as courses do change, you will need to contact the universities you are interested in for further information.



GREAT CYCLE CHALLENGE

Cancer is the largest killer of children in Australia. Over 600 Australian children are diagnosed with cancer every year and, sadly, three children die every week of cancer.

The Great Cycle Challenge is a cycling foundation that raises money for those seeking cures for children's cancers. Macey Parry, Liam Palling, Allegra Roberts, Dylan Jacobs, Lily Cain, Angus Ostarcevic, Gina Ross and myself (Baylie Lang) are part of Highview's EBT community and we have joined forces to compete in this year's cycling challenge. We have set ourselves a total riding goal of 2,500km within the month of October. We are also aiming to raise \$2500 for the foundation.

To be able to complete this we have individual riding and fundraising goals which will help us to achieve our collective goal. So far we have raised \$2,093.33. The Highview College team rides to school every day and has training every Monday, Wednesday and also Sundays. This will not only get us ready for the Energy Breakthrough but will assist us to clock up the kilometres for the Great Cycle Challenge. We track our Kilometres through Apps and fitness trackers which we are able to link to our account which counts our distance for us.

The 'Great Cycle Challenge' began in 2013. After just five years, the event has grown to become one of the biggest cycling events in Australia. People of all ages, abilities and from every State set themselves a personal riding goal and challenge themselves to pedal throughout October to fight kids' cancer.

In five years, the community of 42,498 riders from all six states and two territories have ridden a total of 10,305,632km. Together they have raised \$12,280,194 in support of research to develop better treatments and to seek a cure for childhood cancer.

We are riding to give all kids the bright futures they deserve. We believe that everyone can make a difference and that the best thing that can come from this is a world without cancer where all kids are living life, not fighting for it. If you can't join the riders, sponsor them!




