Dear Community Member,

Proposed new Constitution for Highview Christian Community College

The College Community is facing a decision with the potential of real enhancement of the future of the College, and I wish to encourage you to be involved in that decision-making. At a general meeting of the Members of the College on 27^{th} March, a vote will be taken on the adoption of a new Constitution for Highview.

Let me first declare my interest in the matter. As General Manager, I support the seventeen schools which make up the Victorian Ecumenical System of Schools. This marvellous co-operative of independent schools had its origins at Highview, and, through extra funding and a range of services, supports schools across Victoria. It is important to all these schools that each member school has in place appropriate governance arrangements.

The current constitutional foundation of Highview dates back to its beginnings in 1973. The framework appropriate for a fledgling school then is in many ways no longer appropriate, and in some ways ignores or contradicts current legislation. Highview is today one of the major employers in Maryborough, responsible for the futures of hundreds of fine young people.

The proposed new Constitution and a guide to the same are published on the College's website. Changes which these documents embody reflect a better understanding of the distinction between **governance** (whereby the Board has responsibility for matters such as strategy, finance and compliance) and **management** (whereby the Principal and senior staff control the educational administration of the school).

A major focus of the new Constitution enshrines a Board composition which will ensure that the members of the Board ("Directors") are more experienced and better qualified. In this day and age, directors have much greater responsibilities for the solvency of companies, for risk management, for compliance in many areas, most importantly in child protection, for policy development, for employment agreements, etc. The new Constitution replaces twelve-month terms of office (quite inadequate for an understanding of the role) with three-year terms for Directors. It also makes provision for the Board itself to appoint up to three (of a total of twelve) Directors, and so fill any serious gap in skills on the Board.



NAPLAN on paper information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The tests provide parents and schools with an The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process; they do not replace orogoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN tests also provide schools, education NAFLAW lesis also provide solutions, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What will be tested?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

How can I help my child prepare for NAPLAN?

Help your child prepare for NAPLAN by reassuring them that the tests are just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

The importance of staying connected with your preferred learning institutions prior to further study

Many courses accept Year 12 graduates on the basis of their ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank) and meeting any prerequisite subject requirements. Some courses, however, have additional requirements (e.g. an audition, a folio presentation, completion of a selection kit, attendance at an interview). You are advised to check these out on the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) website (www.vtac.edu.au). Applicants for courses apply on the VTAC website, commencing in August each year. Up to eight courses can be applied for.

In addition, it is helpful to attend open days, seminars and information sessions at your preferred future learning institution(s). Universities, TAFE's and some independent providers open their doors, usually once a year on Sundays in August, for the public to see facilities, attend information sessions, talk to staff and current students, and to check out clubs and societies. These are useful for obtaining a more in-depth experience of a particular institution and its courses.

Work Experience

The final week of Term 2 (25-29 June) is Work Experience Week for all Year 10 students at Highview. This week is designed to give students insight into an industry they are considering working in when they leave school.

Students should be in the process of contacting businesses now to arrange their placement. It is an expectation that students find their own placement, however please do not hesitate to contact Mrs Howlett if assistance is required. Please note: if a student is wishing to complete their placement at a hospital, they will need to contact Mrs Howlett who will arrange the placement for them.

Once a placement has been found:

- Collect a Work Experience Arrangement Form from the Careers Office in the Technology Building.

- Have student, parent/guardian and employer complete and sign their sections of the form.

- Return Form to Mrs Howlett in the Careers Office (can be via the Office).


