#### MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

Year 9 students started the year with a STRIVE taster session of Choices options. The Program is comprised of six choices. As you can see by the photos, fun and learning happen together for Year 9 students.

**Rock & Water** is a program for Year 9 boys. It contains a range of experiential exercises designed to support young men to develop self-awareness through physical exercise. The aim of the program is to support young men in developing body awareness, emotional awareness and self-awareness.

**Roar** is a program for Year 9 girls. It is designed to build self-awareness, respectful relationships, conversation, relaxation and reflection. Roar aims to support girls in learning how to develop healthy relationships with friends, family, each other and themselves in a relaxed and fun manner.

**Outdoor Pursuits** encourages teamwork, helps to develop leadership skills through group activities and challenges and enables students to step outside their comfort zones. It includes rock climbing, surfing and canoeing.

**Circus & Performance** gives students the opportunity to learn to juggle, tumble, dance and balance. They amaze audiences with devil sticks and glo-poi tricks and they create their own show which they perform at the end of the rotation.

#### **UNIFORM**

The way each student wears the uniform is an indicator of their commitment to and appreciation of their learning opportunities. Highview has a lovely uniform which is formal but functional.

The Uniform Policy addresses the total appearance of the student while at school and travelling to and from school. The uniform is seen as an external statement of the quality of students being educated at Highview College. It presents to the public an image that is in line with the school ethos. Wearing a uniform assists in creating an identity for the school and aids in developing pride and unity in the sense of belonging to the school community.

A uniform promotes a sense of inclusiveness, antidiscrimination and equal opportunity, while reinforcing the perception that our school is a safe and respectful environment.

It is an expectation of enrolment that students will respect the uniform and that families will assist us in ensuring that it is worn well. Students who arrive at school dressed inappropriately may be supplied with items which will be charged to his/her parent/guardian account.

A student who is out of uniform due to extenuating



circumstances should explain their situation to the Pastoral Care Co-ordinator. Parents or students experiencing difficulty should contact the school for support. We do have emergency supplies of some uniform items which we are happy to supply.

#### HAIR

- · Well-brushed, neat and tidy and off the face at all times
- Shoulder length or longer hair must be tied back from the face
- Ribbons, hairbands and headbands must be navy, white or red (single colour only)
- Hair should be a natural colour (avoid streaks and other effects)
- Spikes, mohawks or unusual styles are not acceptable
- · Hair cannot be any shorter than a No. 2 cut
- · No facial hair
- Sideburns no longer than the earlobe

Students considering changing their hairstyle who are unsure that it will be appropriate are asked to discuss this with their DELTA mentor first.

#### **Conveyance Allowance**

The conveyance allowance is a form of financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest appropriate school/campus. The conveyance allowance is available to eligible students travelling by public transport, private car and public bus.

In summary for Highview Students to be eligible:

- Students must attend their closest non-government 'Christian' College
- Reside 4.8km or more from Highview

• Reside 4.8km or more from the closest 'Free Bus Service' bus stop

#### Camps Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF)

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The CSEF is paid directly to the school and is allocated to the school camp/excursion portion of the school fees. Forms will be accepted until 30 June 2017, however, forms are encouraged to be returned as soon as possible.

#### CAREERS NEWS

#### YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

All Year 10 students will be participating in the Work Experience Program. The week this year is 26– 30 June, which is the last week of Term 2. The following is normally the process for arranging Work Experience:

Student makes contact with possible employer

Work Experience paperwork is collected from Careers
Co-ordinator

 Paperwork taken to employer for filling out then returned to Careers Co-ordinator

Paperwork given to Principal for approval

• Folder given to students the week before placement, which contains all paperwork required for Work Experience placement

If a student has difficulty finding a placement, the Careers Co-ordinator has many possibilities for work positions. There is also a site students can access for placements, which is called 'Career Horizons'. If students see a position on this site they need to let the Career Co-ordinator know, as students cannot book themselves. Hospital placements are only done through the Career Co-ordinator. If students are seeking a position at a hospital they will need to be quick, as positions fill fast.

Wattle Grove Motel requires a new logo design. The new logo will appear on their front sign (see above below), web site, business cards, advertisements and other printed promotional material. They have just finished renovating the motel and they want the logo to reflect their new modern facilities.
