FROM THE ACCOUNTS DEPARTMENT

School Fee Payments – direct deposits

When making direct deposits into the Highview bank account for the payment of your fees please include a reference including your **surname and account number**. The details for bank deposits are found on your fee statement.

Fee statements are forwarded via email to the allocated fee payer for each student, so please make sure your email details are up to date. Term Fees are due at the beginning of each term.

Bus Passes

Bus passes must be obtained for students needing to travel on buses that they wouldn't ordinarily travel on. It is important that all students travelling on any of the bus services are accounted for.

Should your child need to travel on a contract bus, a bus pass should be obtained from Steve Broad at M.E.C. (5461 7900). Should your child need to travel on the Castlemaine, Newstead, Maldon or St Arnaud buses, a bus pass can be obtained from the Office - either in the form of a written note or a phone call from the parent or guardian.

Both passes require 48 hours notice.

Private Music Program

No prior musical knowledge is required just a sense of fun and a commitment to practice. UNIFORM REMINDERS

Below is a friendly reminder about some of our expectations for the wearing of Highview uniform.

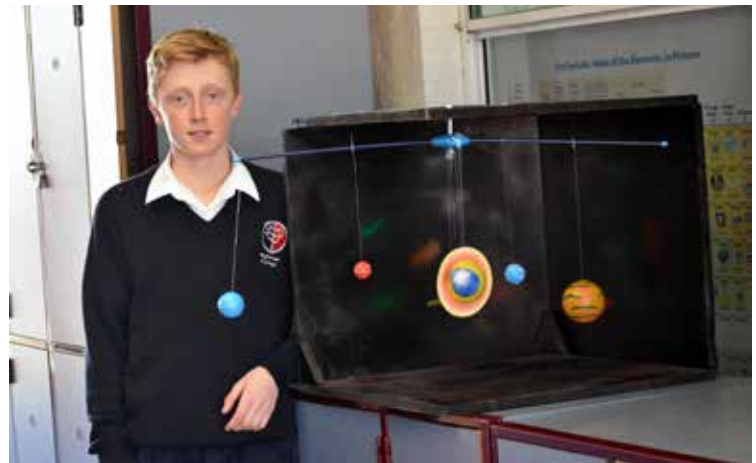
YEAR 7 SCIENCE

THE FIRST ECUMENICAL SCHOOL IN THE WORLD WILL ALWAYS REMAIN TRUE TO ITS BEGINNINGS

In The Maryborough Advertiser on Tuesday 31 July, there was another anonymous Letter to the Editor suggesting that Highview College has moved away from its Christian foundation. For all community members, I extend the following clarification.

We have no intention of diluting the incredible achievement of being the first ecumenical school in the world. You cannot take Christ out of a Christian School, nor is there any thought to do so.

All the changes made at Highview in recent years in regard to Christian teaching have had the support of all four founding Church leaders. The Ecumenical Life Subcommittee of the Board has the responsibility to oversee the Christian teaching at the College and includes all four leaders of the foundation Churches. They agreed that an assessed program, in which many students were being failed, was not in the spirit of providing young people with access to the blessings of Christian faith.

The 'Whole Living' Program was introduced in 2017 to provide students with an opportunity for a more reflective, personal exploration of faith, without assessment. For two years this program has been led by the long-serving Principal, Mr Geoff James, who has a deep understanding and respect for Highview College's beginnings and a deep commitment to 'Education through Wholeness' and ecumenism. This exploration is extended through the Pastoral Care Program, DELTA and imbues everything we do.

- Highview does have the same Chapel it has had for many years and it is well-used
- Highview College also has a Chaplain, who was recently awarded the honour of being 'Victorian Chaplain of the Year'
- Prayer meetings are held every Wednesday lunchtime for interested students and groups gather whenever there is a need for comfort and prayer
- We celebrate our Assemblies in the St Augustine's Church each week and commence and conclude in prayer
- The major liturgical events are celebrated in an ecumenist style, as they always have been at Highview College
- 'Religion & Ethics' studies are offered at Years 9-12
- On the first morning of every week, staff gather and commence the week in prayer
- Christian Values guide all that we do in caring for young people in a safe, non-punitive learning context

We will continue to develop programs which engage the curiosity of young people, expand their thinking and provide them with access to the enrichment of personal faith in a supportive environment.

I warmly invite anyone with concerns to speak with the leader of your Church or come to the College to speak openly with me about any concerns you may have. It would be greatly appreciated if community members would extend the same invitation to anyone who expresses views such as those published recently.

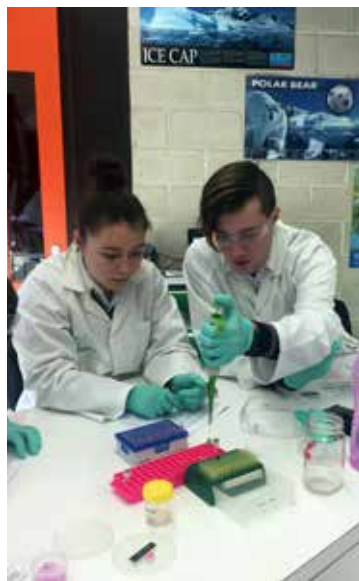
Irene Lloyd from the Maryborough Ambulance Auxiliary presented both students with their awards and the school with a tree to plant on the grounds at an assembly.

Selection is based on a written application about the history of community service/ leadership/ volunteerism, Year 11 and 12 academic results, interview.

If you receive a place in the program, you will receive a guaranteed place in your desired course before you receive your ATAR. Apply between 1 – 24 August, <https://bit.ly/2NQT5aD>

VTAC APPLYING FOR 2019 COURSES

The Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) is the central hub for applications to study courses at Victorian tertiary institutions. VTAC receives, collates and forwards applications to universities, TAFE's and independent

tertiary colleges. These applications include special consideration (SEAS) requests, scholarship applications and any other relevant or required documentation.

All applications are made on the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) website www.vtac.edu.au With applications now open and 'timely applications' closing on Thursday 27 September, it is important for Year 12s to establish their course preferences and consider compiling the following information:

1. Research the courses on offer in your chosen field and preferred institution(s). Use 'CourseSearch' on the VTAC website and VTAC App as the primary source of course information. Visit the college websites for more detailed information and take note of the selection criteria for each course that you wish to apply for, as each course and institution's entry requirements do vary. Many courses require only ATAR, however, a lot have other requirements such as an interview, admission tests, audition, folio presentation, or extra form/documents that need to be completed. Important: Take note of all relevant dates and deadlines.

2. Refine your list. You will be able to apply for up to eight courses. Place them in the order of preference. You won't be able to save a draft of your application, but you will be able to change your preferences after it is completed. (Note: You will be offered a place in the highest course in your list for which you meet the requirements).

3. Register! Create a VTAC user account and have all your details close at hand i.e. educational history, student numbers to ensure that you complete your application accurately. You have until 27 September for a 'timely' application where the normal application fee is \$36.00, after this date the fee rises to \$105.00.

SEAS (Special Entry Access Scheme)

Tertiary institutions are aware that some students' short or long-term circumstances can spoil their academic achievement. The Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) is in place to consider students who are disadvantaged. Most are offered through VTAC's SEAS application process, which cannot be completed until you have made a VTAC course application. There are four SEAS categories:

Category 1: Personal information and location

Category 2: Disadvantaged financial background

Category 3: Disability or medical condition

Category 4: Difficult circumstances.

In addition to the application, some categories will

require you to submit a description of circumstances, an impact statement and a statement of support or financial evidence. Organising your SEAS application can take several weeks so it is important to familiarise yourself with what is required early so you meet the necessary deadlines. Visit <http://www.vtac.edu.au/who/seas.html> for further information. SEAS applications close on 12 October at 5.00pm.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

You can apply for a scholarship through VTAC or the institution directly. For a full list of 'Scholarships available through VTAC visit: <http://www.vtac.edu.au/scholarships/types/available>.

CHOOSING YOUR COURSE PREFERENCES

It is important to put your most desired course first in your list of course preferences even if you think your ATAR won't be high enough. There are few reasons to consider this:

- Some applicants gain entry on lower ATARs because of bonus points achieved, or with a successful SEAS application.
- ATAR's sometimes come down from previous years.
- Some universities allow students to access their courses on a lower ATAR as a result of their involvement in their communities e.g. The 'Community Achiever Program' at ACU, La Trobe's 'Aspire' program.

Remember, if you do not obtain a high enough ATAR to access your course(s), many universities offer pathway programs to their degrees. Some diploma courses may even take you into the second year of your desired degree. Some VET institutions (i.e. Box Hill Institute, Swinburne, RMIT) can also offer formal pathways to university. It is helpful to review these options when deciding on your preferences.

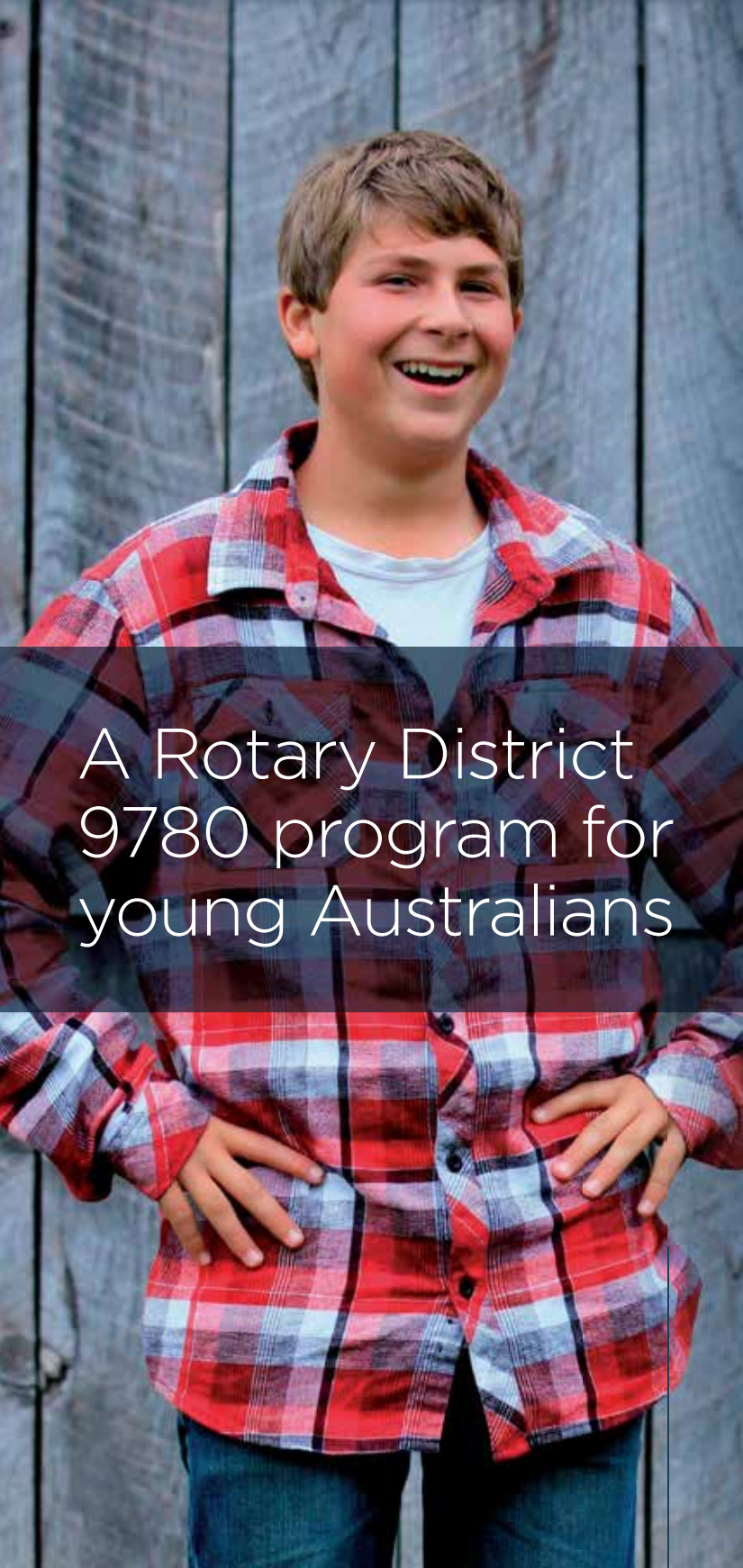
