FROM THE ACCOUNTS DEPARTMENT

School Fee Payments – direct deposits

When making direct deposits into the Highview bank account for the payment of your fees please include a reference including your **surname and account number**. The details for bank deposits are found on your fee statement.

Bus Passes

Bus passes must be obtained for students needing to travel on buses that they wouldn't ordinarily travel on. It is important that all students travelling on any of the bus services are accounted for.

Should your child need to travel on a contract bus, a bus pass should be obtained from Steve Broad at M.E.C. (5461 7900). Should your child need to travel on the Castlemaine, Newstead, Maldon or St Arnaud buses, a bus pass can be obtained from the Office - either in the form of a written note or a phone call from the parent or guardian.

Both passes require 48 hours notice.

UNIFORM ADVICE

Physical Education Uniform Trial

In response to student requests, we are currently trialling a change in Physical Education uniform expectations:

- Physical Education in Lessons 1&2

The Physical Education uniform may be worn to school when students have Physical Education in Lessons 1&2. In this case, students are expected to change back into school uniform during recess.

- Physical Education in Lessons 3&4

Students who have Physical Education in Lessons 3&4 must change into their Physical Education uniform at Recess and back into their formal uniform at lunchtime.

- Physical Education in Lessons 5&6

Students who have Physical Education in Lessons 5&6 will change into their Physical Education uniform at lunchtime. They may however, travel home in their Physical Education uniform when they have Physical Education classes in Lessons 5&6.

This trial will not continue if students do not adhere to the expectations above.

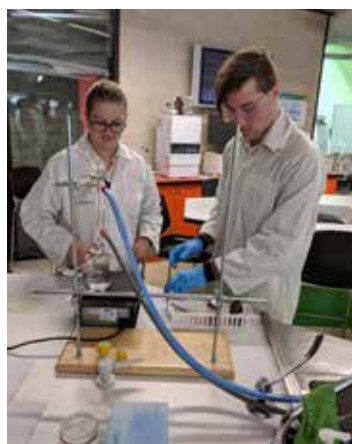


YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY

CASPer Test for entry into Education

The CASPer test is an online tool designed to evaluate key personal and professional characteristics of all applicants applying for courses in Education. It has been found that traditional evaluation methods (interviews, letters and references) have been ineffective. Whereas the CASPer test provides a reliable measure of traits like professionalism, ethics, communication and empathy, reviewing characteristics that make for successful students and graduates. Comprising of 12 sections, each section contains either a video-based scenario or a word-based scenario (i.e. a statement to consider), followed by a series of 3 probing questions.

There are technical (computer and internet) and security requirements and that you will need to follow, to ensure you complete the test correctly.

The universities that are using CASPer for the 2019 admission cycle are; Australian Catholic University, Deakin University, Federation University, La Trobe University, Monash University, RMIT, Swinburne and Victoria University. Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) course deadlines

Double check application dates for the courses you will be applying for via VTAC. Some courses require early applications – including Screenwriting, Animation, Dance, and Film & TV at the University of Melbourne (by Friday 31 August).

SEAS (Special Entry Access Scheme)

Tertiary institutions are aware that some students' short or long-term circumstances can spoil their academic achievement. The Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) is in place to consider students who are disadvantaged. Most are offered through VTAC's SEAS application process, which cannot be completed until you have made a VTAC course application. There are four SEAS categories:

Category 1: Personal information and location

Category 2: Disadvantaged financial background

Category 3: Disability or medical condition

Category 4: Difficult circumstances.

In addition to the application, some categories will require you to submit a description of circumstances, an impact statement and a statement of support or financial evidence. Organising your SEAS application can take several weeks so it is important to familiarise yourself on what is required early so you meet the necessary deadlines. The three school teams placed in the top 2 in their respective sections, an incredible effort! The Finding E'FISH'ency Junior squad achieved high scores across all sections, including WINNING in the race and were the overall Runners Up. The 'Nevis' VCE team WON the race, WON the design & construction, and were the overall Winners in the HPV C division. The '#onlythebeginning' HPV Open team, performed well in all categories, including WINNING the display and presentation, and finished overall Runners Up.

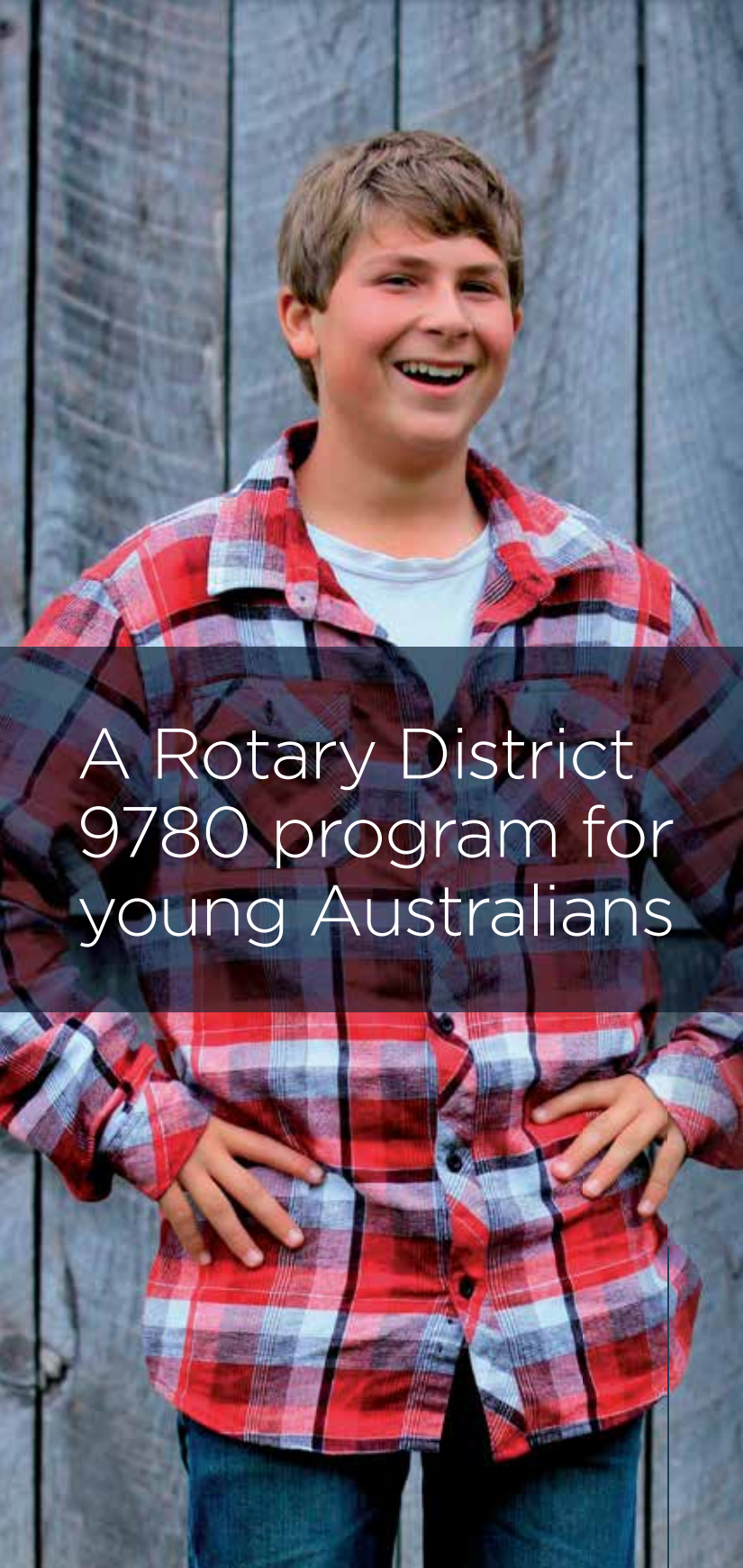

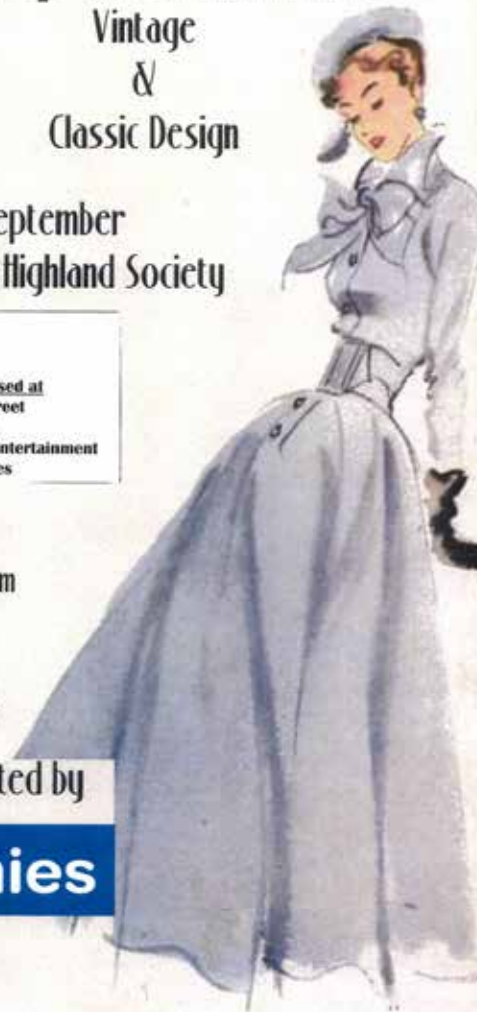
