

Master Plan Activation Launch

Highview College is unique. We know that is a term which is often bandied around, but in our case, it is nothing if not accurate.

Highview College was the first Ecumenical school in the world when established in 1974 and has grown from its opening enrolment of 126 to 426 at the current time. We have a capacity of 504 students. It offers secondary school curriculum (Years 7-12) and prides itself on academic excellence and 'Education through Wholeness'. As a result, our catchment is geographically wide, encompassing six Shires.

The College is a preferred academic education provider for families from the local government Shires of: Central Goldfields, Mount Alexander, Pyrenees, Northern Grampians, Hepburn and Loddon. Across these areas, 32% of our students identify themselves as living in a rural environment, while 68% come from urban areas – which comprise both large and small towns throughout the catchment.

Because of the broader, more general economic status of our catchment, our fees are necessarily low (\$3,400 pa) and we have a disproportionately high

number of bursary students (25%). The Master Plan projects will ensure that aspirational young people in this region are able to enter competitive tertiary courses of study, often being the first in their families to do so.

We require assistance to implement the more critical Master Plan developments which will modernise STEM facilities. Highview College is already established as a technology school, with a supported personal computer program, campus-wide internet access and online continuous assessment. Our objective is to continue to provide for aspirational youth in this region by unifying the campus with a focus on ensuring that students feel valued and have access to contemporary science facilities, upgraded physical education resources and opportunities to explore the creative arts.

In summary, the Master Plan calls for specific stages of implementation with an overall estimated cost of \$12.5m. Clearly this is far beyond the reach of the College in the foreseeable future. We are actively engaging with our local Federal and State Government members for solutions.



New Science Building (STEM)

Science is a growing area of focus as the College establishes itself for academic excellence. The three existing science laboratories are each a good size but are in poor condition with out-of-date facilities. While the physics and chemistry laboratories are on the same floor, the biology laboratory is on a different level which causes safety issues with the movement of chemicals and biology materials.

The plan proposes a new science building that will meet the standard for the contemporary study of senior and junior science. Three laboratories will be provided including a physics, chemistry and biology laboratory. Each laboratory will be designed to also accommodate general science for the junior science students. A larger preparation space will be provided between the chemistry and biology laboratories. An Extended Experimental Investigations (EEI) space will be provided to all laboratories. This space enables students to perform longer experiments that can be safely stored while other classes take place in the laboratories. It will also allow the laboratory assistant to move safely between the laboratories with chemicals and equipment without potentially colliding with students.

The new science building will have direct and equitable access from the open internal space. It will be located so that there will be a visual and physical connection from the centre of the College through to the newly refurbished physical education areas.



Upgraded Physical Education Facilities

Below the science laboratories, an enclosed undercroft area, will accommodate physical education resources storage, study area, change rooms, toilets and gym. The store will be at the level of the upper playing field and therefore allow easy access for staff and students.

Staff will be able to provide equipment for student use direct to the playing areas.

The playing fields are in three tiered levels. The upper level will be artificially turfed and marked for a range of uses. The second level courts will be resurfaced, line-marked and sheltered for multiweather use, and the lower level will house cricket nets.

Between each level retaining walls will be constructed with steps and seating.

'The Hive' & Theatre Refurbishment

The climate in Maryborough can be extreme – very cold in winter and very hot in summer. There is a need for covered eating areas. While there are some covered eating areas in the school, there is no indoor gathering space where students can eat and 'be together'. The new space, 'The Hive' will have a café/canteen, a new theatre space, display areas and lounging areas.

Opening up the theatre to create 'The Hive' provides an opportunity to connect the art quad with the new space and link to the technology building. Gallery space will be provided in 'The Hive' for the display of art pieces, further integrating the art, theatre and technology areas. Generous stairs are provided from the art quad through to the new space. The café/canteen will serve both the new eating area and the foyer to the theatre. There could be an opportunity for food to be provided by the food technology students or an outside provider. Some self-service area could also be provided.

The College has a vibrant drama program with an annual production. The existing theatre is small and needs refurbishment. The proposal relocates the theatre into the gym. This will give the school a larger, more flexible theatre space that will accommodate about 250 people and can still be used as a wet weather gym and for exams.



Community Creative Excellence Hub

Young people in the Central Goldfields are great adopters of The Arts. There is a lively music, art and drama community which welcomes young people.


This creative outlet is already nurtured at Highview College with both School Productions and semi-

professional Community Theatre Productions performed on site.

A quality performance centre which could be used by the whole community throughout the year would benefit young people in this region, particularly those not engaged in community sport.

Uniting the Highview College Campus

The College has a closed road through the centre of the campus. A landscape development would result in the removal of the road through the centre of the College. Growth over time has resulted in little cohesion between buildings and problematic traffic flow. The Master Plan aims to rectify these challenges for a safer and more engaging learning environment.



Commitment to our Region

Our commitment to this vision for Highview College is evident in the completion of a range of projects identified through our consultative Master Plan process in 2016 totalling \$618,256.

We are repurposing existing buildings wherever possible and using local companies in our broad

catchment to prepare for and to complete the construction.

Our priority is to invest in the future of our region though educating aspirational young people and through collaborating with local companies.

School Fee Payments - direct deposits

Conveyance Allowance

The conveyance allowance is a form of financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest appropriate school/campus. The conveyance allowance is available to eligible students travelling by public transport, private car and public bus.

• Reside 4.8km or more from Highview

Apprenticeships and Traineeships

Apprenticeships and Traineeships are a great career option for students looking to combine practical work with structured training. Australian Apprenticeships (often referred to as apprenticeships or traineeships) are available to anyone of working age and you do not need a secondary school certificate or other qualification to begin your apprenticeship. There are many opportunities to train, study and earn an income in most occupations and traditional trades which offer a variety of qualification levels. Upon completion you will obtain a nationally recognised qualification and receive the experience you need to get the job you are looking for.

There are 5 simple steps to follow to help you find an Australian apprenticeship:

1. Establish your chosen career pathway. Visit websites, do the research and undertake the necessary quizzes to match occupations with your interests. (Visit https:// www.aapathways.com.au/careers-for-australianapprenticeships-traineesh/interest-explorer-page and https://www.australianapprenticeships.gov.au/australianschool-based-apprenticeships)

2. Discuss these options with your career advisers and

teachers

3. Write your resume. You will need to include your contact details, school studies, achievements, work experience, interests, skills and career goals.

4. Find an employer who is looking for an apprentice. This can take a little bit of time but being patient can be worth your while. Subscribe to the various websites online such as https://jobsearch.gov.au/jobseekerapp. Job Active has a 'Job Seeker' app which allows you to establish a job plan, browse and apply for jobs and track your applications.

5. Formalise all the paperwork.

• Searching for courses by keyword or course code, filtering your results by institution, campus, area of interest, qualification type and application method.

• Entering your Year 12 study program into the prerequisite and course explorer, establishing a shortlist of courses.

• Enables you to create a VTAC account to check your ATAR and tertiary offer status.

Course content on this application is always updated so it is important to have internet connection to receive

amended information.

NAPLAN on paper – information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process; they do not replace orgoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN tests also provide schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What will be tested?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

How can I help my child prepare for NAPLAN?

Help your child prepare for NAPLAN by reassuring them that the tests are just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply ity their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN tests.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. A formal exemption may be granted for a student with significant intellectual disability and/or significant coexisting conditions, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

Your child will sit the NAPLAN paper tests in 2018

However, children in some other schools across Australia may sit the NAPLAN online tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that NAPLAN will move online over the next two to three years. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

As students are presented with questions that test the same range of difficulty, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats will be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale.
